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The proposed 2022/2023 grant budget will allow the Siskiyou County Victim Witness Assistance Program to concentrate on direct services to victims and the day-to-day needs of the program. All funds in the proposed budget are designed to support the objectives and activities of this project. Approximately 88% of the \$205,624 VW funding will be allocated to wages and benefits for program staff to provide direct services to victims of crime. Funding will allow for wages and benefits equivalent to an FTE of 2.36. The program Coordinator will be funded at .80 FTE, and two Victim Advocates funded at 1.23 FTE, with an Extra Help Administrative Support Assistant/Legal Secretary at .33 FTE. The coordinator's remaining .20 FTE and one of the advocate's remaining .14 FTE will be dedicated to the County Victim Services (XC) Program grant. Functional timecards will reflect these FTE's and the types of services provided. Due to the low population of the county and economic depression we are requesting a VOCA 20 & VOCA 22 match waiver of 100%.

Operating expenses will be funded at approximately 12% to be used for workshops and trainings, VW Entry Level Advocate and Crisis Response training. We have budgeted for VW Entry Level Advocate training for our Advocate hired last December. Additional budgeted items are membership dues for the California Crime Victims Assistance Association, office supplies, communications,

maintenance for Xerox copier, client victim assistance, outreach efforts to crime victims and their families and National Crime Victim's Rights Week activities.

At this time, we do not anticipate the need for subcontracts and/or any unusual expenditure during the 2022/2023 grant year, however, should those issues arise, we will do a modification outlining any changes to our grant budget.

Advocate, MVA, and Coordinator Qualifications

The Siskiyou County District Attorney's Victim Witness Assistance Program currently has one Coordinator, one full time Victim/Witness Advocate, one part time Victim/Witness Advocate and an MVA. The Coordinator, Coleen Chiles has worked for Victim Witness in Siskiyou County for 25 years. She has gone through the Entry Level, Advanced Advocate II and Coordinator training mandated by Cal OES. Karen Simas, our part time Victim/Witness Advocate has worked for the DA's office for 32 years; she took the position of Victim Witness Advocate in 2008 she also has been trained in the Entry Level and Advanced Advocate II training. Cynthia Billingsley, our MVA, worked as a secretary for the district attorney for five years before applying to be a victim advocate. She took the MVA position in 2020. She attended Entry Level Training in September 2021



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and will attend Advanced Advocate II training and Crisis Response trainings when they become available. Cynthia has also completed the VAT Online training for victim advocates and NOVA's Crisis Response Training I. Maria Branigin, our full time Victim/Witness Advocate, worked for Siskiyou Domestic Violence and Crisis Center as an advocate for 8 years before accepting a position as a Victim/Witness Advocate at the DA's office in December 2021. Maria will attend Entry Level Advocate Training as soon as a training becomes available. Maria has Completed all Entry Level pre-requisites. She has also completed the VAT Online training for victim advocates and NOVA's Crisis Response Training I. Throughout the several years of employment with our local Victim Witness office the Coordinator and Advocates have attended and participated in numerous trainings and webinars regarding victim issues and advocacy for victims of crime and their families.

Mass Victimization Advocate Funding Narrative

The proposed 2022/2023 MVA grant funding of \$100,000 will be dedicated to developing and maintaining a plan to support and enhance immediate response and recovery efforts and establish readiness in response to mass victimization/terrorism incidents. Approximately 86% of the MVA funding will be



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allocated to wages and benefits for the MVA position. Functional timecards will reflect these FTE's and the types of services provided.

Operating expenses will be funded at approximately 14% to establish resources needed to continue developing and put in place a crisis response plan for mass victimization for Siskiyou County. The Operating budget includes office supplies, communication needs, and auto maintenance. The crisis response technology supplies and generator will be for all staff in the Victim Witness Assistance Program grant who will also respond as a county team to any mass victimization incident. Mileage is budgeted for the MVA to attend Regional Crisis Response quarterly meetings. Advance-Level Victim Witness Advocate training and Crisis Response training expenses are budgeted for the MVA position.

There are no Equipment expenses budgeted at this time.

At this time, we do not anticipate the need for subcontracts and/or any unusual expenditure during the 2022/2023 grant year, however, should those issues arise, we will do a modification outlining any changes to our grant budget.



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The following services are provided to all crime victims and their family members pursuant to the California Penal Code section 13835 as part of our comprehensive Victim Witness Assistance Program. Crisis Intervention, emergency assistance, resource and referral assistance, referrals to direct counseling/therapy, assistance with California Victim Compensation Program claims, property return, orientation to the criminal justice system, court escort, presentations and training for criminal justice agencies, public presentations, and publicity, advise of case status and disposition. When requested notification of family/friends, inform employer and employer intervention, and assist in obtaining restitution. Optional services will be provided as needed and/or available.

To provide these services we will make initial contact with victims via telephone text, email, mail correspondence and/or personal contact as soon after the crime as possible and/or when we receive a referral. Whenever needed and as feasible we will try to conduct field visits to those victims who are unable to meet with us in our office.



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We have Operational Agreements between Siskiyou Domestic Violence and Crisis Center and the Siskiyou County Human Services Department. We work together with these agencies to provide concentrated advocacy services for domestic violence, sexual assault, and child crime victims.

The Victim Services Program will continue to maintain good working relationships with law enforcement agencies and other agencies throughout Siskiyou County. We will maintain and participate as a member of various organizations to network with other agencies to better serve victims and their families.

Presentations will be offered to agencies, organizations, and at community meetings on the importance of services our program has to offer to all victims of crime.

We will take advantage of the latest trainings and webinars to better our education and skills regarding issues revolving around crime victims and assistance that we can provide for them. Our program will budget for untrained Advocates to attend Victim Advocate and Crisis Response training.



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Mass Victimization Advocate - MVA

With MVA funding Siskiyou County will continue the development of our plan to support and enhance immediate response and recovery efforts and establish readiness in response to mass victimization/terrorism incidents.

The funding will support an MVA (Mass Victimization Advocate) at one full time equivalent. This position will remain dedicated to further the objectives of developing a crisis response plan to mass victimization for Siskiyou County. When the MVA is not working on the crisis response job duties, plans and protocol they will be available to carry a modified caseload to assist victims and their family members with services needed to assist them through the criminal justice system process. The MVA will provide direct services to victims of crime and their family members pursuant to California Penal Code 13835.5 and Penal Code 679-680.

The MVA has attended and completed the CCVAA 40-hour Entry Level

Advocate training. In addition, the MVA will attend CCVAA Crisis Response

Advocate training. As the MVA becomes trained and established additional

trainings will be attended to better advance their skills in dealing with crisis and

mass victimization incidents.



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The goal is to continue to develop a comprehensive crisis response and mass victimization assistance plan aimed at identifying and responding to victim immediate needs and provide immediate services in the aftermath of a crime-related mass victimization or terrorism incident. The MVA will create crisis response protocols. Implement mutual aid Memorandums of Understanding with VW Centers in neighboring counties within the CCVAA identified Crisis Response training region and attend regional crisis response meeting as scheduled quarterly. Additionally, the MVA virtually attends CCVAA Crisis Response Advocate trainings and MVA Roundtable meetings. The MVA will conduct outreach and participate in community meetings with law enforcement, emergency management, medical services-public health. Establish MOUs with allied service providers including governmental and non-profit agencies and local Emergency Operation Centers.

MVA funding will be utilized to provide go-bags with, supplies, equipment and needed technology and other resources needed for deployment.

Finally, with all the above in place the MVA will be able to create a crisis response plan and protocol to support and enhance immediate response and



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recovery efforts and establish readiness in response to mass victimization incidents.

Volunteers

Our program utilizes one volunteer she is a senior citizen and faithfully comes to the office once a week. She has been our volunteer since September of 2008. Her time is documented on a timecard like an employee timecard. Background checks are done, and a county volunteer packet is submitted to our personnel department. Some of her duties include but are not limited to printing, folding, and distributing crime prevention information and brochures about our program. She sorts old, dated material, shredding old reports, etc.
