PARTICIPATING AGREEMENT Between The COUNTY OF SISKIYOU And The USDA, FOREST SERVICE KLAMATH NATIONAL FOREST

This PARTICIPATING AGREEMENT is hereby entered into by and between the County of Siskiyou, hereinafter referred to as "COS," and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), Forest Service, Klamath National Forest, hereinafter referred to as the "U.S. Forest Service," under the authority: Wyden Amendment, (Public Law 105-227, Section 323 as amended by Public Law 109-54, Section 434, and permentatley authorized by Public Law 111-11, Section 3001).

<u>Background</u>: The U.S. Forest Service and COS have a long history of coordination and cooperation in the field of noxious weed management. The COS serves as the repository for all noxious weed locations in the county, thus Data sets on public lands are routinely shared. Shared skills in the fields of plant identification and GIS database management aid to solidify and benefit the weed management programs of each agency.

<u>Title</u>: Weed Management on Private Lands

I. PURPOSE:

The purpose of this agreement is to document the cooperation between the parties to manage noxious weeds in Siskiyou County and assist in meeting conservation goals for plant species of concern on privately owned lands, in accordance with the following provisions and the hereby incorporated Operating and Financial Plan, attached as Exhibit A.

II. STATEMENT OF MUTUAL BENEFIT AND INTERESTS:

The parties to this agreement recognize that certain noxious and non-native invasive plant species pose a threat to the environmental health of the County by the displacement of native plant species, and the degradation of wildlife habitat, forest, range and agricultural lands, and recreational values.



The U.S. Forest Service and COS both have the responsibility for controlling noxious and non-native invasive plant species on lands under their jurisdiction. Since undesirable plants originate from both private and public lands, and since infestation often occur on adjacent jurisdictions, it is in the interest of both parties to work together in a cost effective manner to locate and treat infestations and prevent their spread. In addition, the sharing of data sets and skills of employees of each agency provide mutual benefits in the management of noxious weeds that know no boundaries.

In consideration of the above premises, the parties agree as follows:

III. SCDA SHALL:

- A. <u>LEGAL AUTHORITY</u>. COS shall have the legal authority to enter into this agreement, and the institutional, managerial, and financial capability to ensure proper planning, management, and completion of the project, which includes funds sufficient to pay the non-Federal share of project costs, when applicable.
- B. Coordinate with the U.S. Forest Service regarding priority treatment areas prior to each field season
- C. Coordinate with the U.S. Forest Service in a timely manner, to discuss problems that may occur during the term of the agreement
- D. Obtain permission from private landowners for weed treatment on their lands.
- E. Follow all laws and regulations regarding the application of herbicides on private lands. Be in total control of material selection, crew supervision, and all equipment and supplies needed to accomplish weed treatment.
- F. Provide the U.S. Forest Service with an annual report by December 31st of each treatment year. Report will include at a minimum: acres covered per species, acres treated per species, and photographs pre/post treatment at priority or heavily infested sites.

IV. THE U.S. FOREST SERVICE SHALL:

A. PAYMENT/REIMBURSEMENT. The U.S. Forest Service shall reimburse COS for the U.S. Forest Service's share of actual expenses incurred, not to exceed \$28,000.00, as shown in the Financial Plan. In order to approve a Request for Reimbursement, the U.S. Forest Service shall review such requests to ensure payments for reimbursement are in compliance and otherwise consistent with the terms of the agreement. The U.S. Forest Service shall make payment upon receipt of COS's invoice. Each invoice from COS shall display the total project costs for the billing period, separated by U.S. Forest Service and COS's share. In-kind contributions must be displayed as a separate line item and must not be included in the total project costs available for reimbursement. The final invoice must display COS's full match



towards the project, as shown in the financial plan, and be submitted no later than 90 days from the expiration date.

Each invoice must include, at a minimum:

- 1. COS's name, address, and telephone number.
- 2. U.S. Forest Service agreement number.
- 3. Invoice date.
- 4. Performance dates of the work completed (start & end).
- 5. Total invoice amount for the billing period, separated by the U.S. Forest Service and COS share with in-kind contributions displayed as a separate line item.
- 6. Display all costs, both cumulative and for the billing period, by separate cost element as shown on the financial plan.
- 7. Cumulative amount of U.S. Forest Service payments to date.
- 8. Statement that the invoice is a request for payment by "reimbursement".
- 9. If using SF-270, a signature is required.
- 10. Invoice Number, if applicable.

- B. Coordinate with COS regarding priority treatment areas on private and FS lands.
- C. Provide support in determining ownership boundaries for treatments on private and FS lands.
- D. Record all treatments on FS lands in the appropriate databases of record, including the National Resource Inventory System (NRIS) and Forest Activity Tracking System (FACTS).

B. <u>NOTICES</u>. Any communications affecting the operations covered by this agreement given by the U.S. Forest Service or COS are sufficient only if in writing and delivered in person, mailed, or transmitted electronically by e-mail or fax, as follows:

To the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager, at the address specified in the agreement.

To COS, at the address shown in the agreement or such other address designated within the agreement.

Notices are effective when delivered in accordance with this provision, or on the effective date of the notice, whichever is later.



- C. <u>PARTICIPATION IN SIMILAR ACTIVITIES</u>. This agreement in no way restricts the U.S. Forest Service or COS from participating in similar activities with other public or private agencies, organizations, and individuals.
- D. <u>ENDORSEMENT</u>. Any of COS's contributions made under this agreement do not by direct reference or implication convey U.S. Forest Service endorsement of COS's products or activities.
- E. <u>USE OF U.S. FOREST SERVICE INSIGNIA</u>. In order for COS to use the U.S. Forest Service Insignia on any published media, such as a Web page, printed publication, or audiovisual production, permission must be granted from the U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communications (Washington Office). A written request will be submitted by the U.S. Forest Service to the Office of Communications Assistant Director, Visual Information and Publishing Services, prior to use of the insignia. The U.S. Forest Service will notify the COS when permission is granted.
- F. NON-FEDERAL STATUS FOR COOPERATOR PARTICIPANTS. COS agree(s) that any of COS's employees, volunteers, and program participants shall not be deemed to be Federal employees for any purposes including Chapter 171 of Title 28, United States Code (Federal Tort Claims Act) and Chapter 81 of Title 5, United States Code (OWCP), as COS has hereby willingly agreed to assume these responsibilities.
 - Further, COS shall provide any necessary training to COS's employees, volunteers, and program participants to ensure that such personnel are capable of performing tasks to be completed. COS shall also supervise and direct the work of its employees, volunteers, and participants performing under this agreement.
- G. <u>MEMBERS OF CONGRESS</u>. Pursuant to 41 U.S.C. 22, no member of, or delegate to, Congress shall be admitted to any share or part of this agreement, or benefits that may arise therefrom, either directly or indirectly.
- H. <u>NONDISCRIMINATION</u>. The recipient/cooperator of this award must comply with all applicable Federal anti-discrimination laws and regulations. For more information about USDA Civil Rights requirements, please visit https://www.usda.gov/about-usda/general-information/staff-offices/office-assistant-secretary-civil-rights
- I. <u>ELIGIBLE WORKERS</u>. COS shall ensure that all employees complete the I-9 form to certify that they are eligible for lawful employment under the Immigration and Nationality Act (8 USC 1324a). COS shall comply with regulations regarding certification and retention of the completed forms. These requirements also apply to any contract awarded under this agreement.



J. SYSTEM FOR AWARD MANAGEMENT REGISTRATION REQUIREMENT (SAM). COS shall maintain current organizational information and the original Unique Entity Identifier (UEI) provided for this agreement in the System for Award Management (SAM) until receipt of final payment. This requires annual review and updates, when needed, of organizational information after the initial registration. More frequent review and updates may be required for changes in organizational information or agreement term(s). Any change to the original UEI provided in this agreement will result in termination of this agreement and de-obligation of any

remaining funds. For purposes of this agreement, System for Award Management (SAM) means the Federal repository into which an entity must provide information required for the conduct of business as a Cooperative. Additional information about registration procedures may be found at the SAM Internet site at www.sam.gov.

K. STANDARDS FOR FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT.

1. Financial Reporting

SOS shall provide complete, accurate, and current financial disclosures of the project or program in accordance with any financial reporting requirements, as set forth in the financial provisions.

2. Accounting Records

SOS shall continuously maintain and update records identifying the source and use of funds. The records shall contain information pertaining to the agreement, authorizations, obligations, unobligated balances, assets, outlays, and income.

3. Internal Control

SOS shall maintain effective control over and accountability for all U.S. Forest Service funds, real property, and personal property assets. COS shall keep effective internal controls to ensure that all United States Federal funds received are separately and properly allocated to the activities described in the agreement and used solely for authorized purposes.

4. Source Documentation

SOS shall support all accounting records with source documentation. These documentations include, but are not limited to, cancelled checks, paid bills, payrolls, contract and contract documents. These documents must be made available to the U.S. Forest Service upon request.



- L. <u>INDIRECT COST RATES- PARTNERSHIP</u>. Indirect costs are approved for reimbursement or as a cost-share requirement and have an effective period applicable to the term of this agreement.
 - 1. If COS has never received or does not currently have a negotiated indirect cost rate, they are eligible for a de minimis indirect cost rate up to 15 percent of modified total direct costs (MTDC). MTDC is defined as all direct salaries and wages, applicable fringe benefits, materials and supplies, services, travel, and up to the first \$50,000 of each subaward (regardless of the period of performance of the subawards under the award).
- LI. For rates greater than 15 percent and less than 25 percent, COS shall maintain documentation to support the rate. Documentation may include, but is not limited to, accounting records, audit results, cost allocation plan, letter of indirect cost rate approval from an independent accounting firm, or other Federal agency approved rate notice applicable to agreements.
- LII. For a rate greater than 25 percent, the U.S. Forest Service may require that COS request a federally approved rate from COS's cognizant audit agency no later than 3 months after the effective date of the agreement. COS will be reimbursed for indirect costs or allowed to cost-share at the rate reflected in the agreement until the rate is formalized in the negotiated indirect cost rate (NICRA) at which time, reimbursements for prior indirect costs or cost-sharing may be subject to adjustment.
- LIII. Failure to provide adequate documentation supporting the indirect cost rate, if requested, could result in disallowed costs and repayment to the U.S. Forest Service.
 - M. <u>OVERPAYMENT</u>. Any funds paid to COS in excess of the amount entitled under the terms and conditions of this agreement constitute a debt to the Federal Government. The following must also be considered as a debt or debts owed by COS to the U.S. Forest Service:
 - Any interest or other investment income earned on advances of agreement funds; or
 - Any royalties or other special classes of program income which, under the provisions of the agreement, are required to be returned;

If this debt is not paid according to the terms of the bill for collection issued for the overpayment, the U.S. Forest Service may reduce the debt by:

- 1. Making an administrative offset against other requests for reimbursement.
- 2. Withholding advance payments otherwise due to COS.
- 3. Taking other action permitted by statute (31 U.S.C. 3716 and 7 CFR, Part 3, Subpart B).



Except as otherwise provided by law, the U.S. Forest Service may charge interest on an overdue debt.

N. <u>AGREEMENT CLOSE-OUT</u>. Within 120 days after expiration or notice of termination COS shall close out the agreement.

Any unobligated balance of cash advanced to COS must be immediately refunded to the U.S. Forest Service, including any interest earned in accordance with 7CFR3016.21/2CFR 215.22.

Within a maximum of 120 days following the date of expiration or termination of this agreement, all financial performance and related reports required by the terms of the agreement must be submitted to the U.S. Forest Service by COS.

If this agreement is closed out without audit, the U.S. Forest Service reserves the right to disallow and recover an appropriate amount after fully considering any recommended disallowances resulting from an audit which may be conducted later.

O. <u>PROGRAM MONITORING AND PROGRAM PERFORMANCE REPORTS</u>. The parties to this agreement shall monitor the performance of the agreement activities to ensure that performance goals are being achieved.

Performance reports must contain information on the following:

- A comparison of actual accomplishments to the goals established for the period. Wherever the output of the project can be readily expressed in numbers, a computation of the cost per unit of output, if applicable.
- Reason(s) for delay if established goals were not met.
- Additional pertinent information.

COS shall submit annual performance reports to the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager. These reports are due 90 days after the reporting period. The final performance report must be submitted either with COS's final payment request, or separately, but not later than 90 days from the expiration date of the agreement.

P. RETENTION AND ACCESS REQUIREMENTS FOR RECORDS. COS shall retain all records pertinent to this agreement for a period of no less than 3 years from the expiration or termination date. As used in this provision, records includes books, documents, accounting procedures and practice, and other data, regardless of the type or format. COS shall provide access and the right to examine all records related to this agreement to the U.S. Forest Service, Inspector General, or Comptroller General or their authorized representative. The rights of access in this section must not be



limited to the required retention period but must last as long as the records are kept.

If any litigation, claim, negotiation, audit, or other action involving the records has been started before the end of the 3-year period, the records must be kept until all issues are resolved, or until the end of the regular 3-year period, whichever is later.

Records for nonexpendable property acquired in whole or in part, with Federal funds must be retained for 3 years after its final disposition.

- Q. <u>FREEDOM OF INFORMATION ACT (FOIA)</u>. Public access to grant or agreement records must not be limited, except when such records must be kept confidential and would have been exempted from disclosure pursuant to Freedom of Information regulations (5 U.S.C. 552). Requests for research data are subject to 2 CFR 215.36. Public access to culturally sensitive data and information of Federally recognized Tribes may also be explicitly limited by P.L. 110-234, Title VIII Subtitle B §8106 (2008 Farm Bill).
- R. TEXT MESSAGING WHILE DRIVING. In accordance with Executive Order (EO) 13513, "Federal Leadership on Reducing Text Messaging While Driving," any and all text messaging by Federal employees is banned: a) while driving a Government owned vehicle (GOV) or driving a privately owned vehicle (POV) while on official Government business; or b) using any electronic equipment supplied by the Government when driving any vehicle at any time. All Cooperators, their Employees, Volunteers, and Contractors are encouraged to adopt and enforce policies that ban text messaging when driving company owned, leased or rented vehicles, POVs or GOVs when driving while on official Government business or when performing any work for or on behalf of the Government.
- S. <u>PUBLIC NOTICES</u>. It is The U.S. Forest Service's policy to inform the public as fully as possible of its programs and activities. COS is/are encouraged to give public notice of the receipt of this agreement and, from time to time, to announce progress and accomplishments. Press releases or other public notices should reference the Agency as follows:
 - "Natural Resource Department, Klamath National Forest of the U.S. Forest Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture"
 - COS may call on The U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communication for advice regarding public notices. COS is/are requested to provide copies of notices or announcements to the U.S. Forest Service Program Manager and to The U.S. Forest Service's Office of Communications as far in advance of release as possible.
- T. <u>FUNDING EQUIPMENT</u>. Federal funding under this agreement is not available for reimbursement of COS's purchase of equipment. Equipment is defined as having a fair market value of \$5,000 or more per unit and a useful life of over one year.



- U. <u>CONTRACT REQUIREMENTS</u>. Any contract under this agreement must be awarded following the COS's established procurement procedures, to ensure free and open competition, and avoid any conflict of interest (or appearance of conflict). COS shall maintain cost and price analysis documentation for potential U.S. Forest Service review. COS is/are encouraged to utilize small businesses, minority-owned firms, and women's business enterprises.
- V. <u>U.S. FOREST SERVICE ACKNOWLEDGED IN PUBLICATIONS</u>, <u>AUDIOVISUALS AND ELECTRONIC MEDIA</u>. COS shall acknowledge U.S. Forest Service support in any publications, audiovisuals, and electronic media developed as a result of this agreement.
- W. NONDISCRIMINATION STATEMENT -PRINTED, ELECTRONIC, OR AUDIOVISUAL MATERIAL In accordance with Federal civil rights law and U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) civil rights regulations and policies, the USDA, its Agencies, offices, and employees, and institutions participating in or administering USDA programs are prohibited from discriminating based on race, color, national origin, religion, sex, disability, age, marital status, family/parental status, income derived from a public assistance program, political beliefs, or reprisal or retaliation for prior civil rights activity, in any program or activity conducted or funded by USDA (not all bases apply to all programs). Remedies and complaint filing deadlines vary by program or incident.

Persons with disabilities who require alternative means of communication for program information (e.g., Braille, large print, audiotape, American Sign Language, etc.) should contact the State or local Agency that administers the program or contact USDA through the Telecommunications Relay Service at 711 (voice and TTY). Additionally, program information may be made available in languages other than English. To file a program discrimination complaint, complete the USDA Program Discrimination Complaint Form, AD-3027, found online at How to File a Program Discrimination Complaint and at any USDA office or write a letter addressed to USDA and provide in the letter all of the information requested in the form. 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- X. <u>REMEDIES FOR COMPLIANCE RELATED ISSUES</u>. If COS materially fail(s) to comply with any term of the agreement, whether stated in a Federal statute or regulation, an assurance, or the agreement, the U.S. Forest Service may take one or more of the following actions:
 - 1. Temporarily withhold cash payments pending correction of the deficiency by COS or more severe enforcement action by the U.S. Forest Service;
 - 2. Disallow (that is, deny both use of funds and matching credit for) all or part of the cost of the activity or action not in compliance;
 - 3. Wholly or partly suspend or terminate the current agreement for COS's program;
 - 4. Withhold further awards for the program, or
 - 5. Take other remedies that may be legally available, including debarment procedures under 2 CFR part 417.
- Y. <u>TERMINATION BY MUTUAL AGREEMENT</u>. This agreement may be terminated, in whole or part, as follows:
 - 1. When the U.S. Forest Service and COS agree upon the termination conditions, including the effective date and, in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated.
 - 2. By 30 days written notification by COS to the U.S. Forest Service setting forth the reasons for termination, effective date, and in the case of partial termination, the portion to be terminated. If the U.S. Forest Service decides that the remaining portion of the agreement will not accomplish the purposes for which the agreement was made, the U.S. Forest Service may terminate the agreement in its entirety.

Upon termination of an agreement, COS shall not incur any new obligations for the terminated portion of the agreement after the effective date, and shall cancel as many outstanding obligations as possible. The U.S. Forest Service shall allow full credit to COS for the U.S. Forest Service share of obligations that cannot be cancelled and were properly incurred by COS up to the effective date of the termination. Excess funds must be refunded within 60 days after the effective date of termination.

Z. <u>ALTERNATE DISPUTE RESOLUTION – PARTNERSHIP AGREEMENT</u>. In the event of any issue of controversy under this agreement, the parties may pursue Alternate Dispute Resolution procedures to voluntarily resolve those issues. These procedures may include, but are not limited to conciliation, facilitation, mediation, and fact finding.



- AA. <u>DEBARMENT AND SUSPENSION</u>. COS shall immediately inform the U.S. Forest Service if they or any of their principals are presently excluded, debarred, or suspended from entering into covered transactions with the Federal Government according to the terms of 2 CFR Part 180. Additionally, should COS or any of their principals receive a transmittal letter or other official Federal notice of debarment or suspension, then they shall notify the U.S. Forest Service without undue delay. This applies whether the exclusion, debarment, or suspension is voluntary or involuntary.
- BB. <u>PROHIBITION AGAINST INTERNAL CONFIDENTIAL AGREEMENTS</u>. All non federal government entities working on this agreement will adhere to the below provisions found in the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2016, Pub. L. 114-113, relating to reporting fraud, waste and abuse to authorities:
 - (a) The recipient may not require its employees, contractors, or subrecipients seeking to report fraud, waste, or abuse to sign or comply with internal confidentiality agreements or statements prohibiting or otherwise restricting them from lawfully reporting that waste, fraud, or abuse to a designated investigative or law enforcement representative of a Federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.
 - (b) The recipient must notify its employees, contractors, or subrecipients that the prohibitions and restrictions of any internal confidentiality agreements inconsistent with paragraph (a) of this award provision are no longer in effect.
 - (c) The prohibition in paragraph (a) of this award provision does not contravene requirements applicable to any other form issued by a Federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.
 - (d) If the Government determines that the recipient is not in compliance with this award provision, it:
 - (1) Will prohibit the recipient's use of funds under this award, in accordance with sections 743, 744 of Division E of the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2016, (Pub. L. 114-113) or any successor provision of law; and
 - (2) May pursue other remedies available for the recipient's material failure to comply with award terms and conditions.
- CC. <u>COPYRIGHTING</u>. COS is/are granted sole and exclusive right to copyright any publications developed as a result of this agreement. This includes the right to publish and vend throughout the world in any language and in all media and forms, in whole or in part, for the full term of copyright and all renewals thereof in accordance with this agreement.



No original text or graphics produced and submitted by the U.S. Forest Service shall be copyrighted. The U.S. Forest Service reserves a royalty-free, nonexclusive, and irrevocable right to reproduce, publish, or otherwise use, and to authorize others to use the work for Federal Government purposes. This right must be transferred to any sub-agreements or subcontracts.

This provision includes:

- 1. The copyright in any work developed by COS under this agreement.
- 2. Any right of copyright to which COS purchase(s) ownership with any federal contributions.
- DD. <u>PUBLICATION SALE</u>. COS may sell any publication developed as a result of this agreement. The publication may be sold at fair market value, which is initially defined in this agreement to cover the costs of development, production, marketing, and distribution. After the costs of development and production have been recovered, fair market value is defined in this agreement to cover the costs of marketing, printing, and distribution only. Fair market value must exclude any in-kind or Federal Government contributions from the total costs of the project.
- EE. <u>MODIFICATIONS</u>. Modifications within the scope of this agreement must be made by mutual consent of the parties, by the issuance of a written modification signed and dated by all properly authorized, signatory officials, prior to any changes being performed. Requests for modification should be made, in writing, at least 120 days prior to implementation of the requested change. The U.S. Forest Service is not obligated to fund any changes not properly approved in advance.
- FF. <u>COMMENCEMENT/EXPIRATION DATE</u>. This agreement is executed as of the date of the last signature and is effective through 08/30/2030 at which time it will expire. The expiration date is the final date for completion of all work activities under this agreement.
- GG. <u>AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVES</u>. By signature below, each party certifies that the individuals listed in this document as representatives of the individual parties are authorized to act in their respective areas for matters related to this agreement.
