

ELECTRONIC & UNIVERSAL WASTE COLLECTION, TRANSPORTATION, PROCESSING, AND
RECYCLING SERVICES AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE COUNTY OF SISKIYOU AND CLEAN
HARBORS ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES, INC.

This Agreement ("Agreement") is made and entered into this 15th day of September, 2026
by and between the County of Siskiyou ("County") and CLEAN HARBORS ENVIRONMENTAL
SERVICES, INC., a corporation ("Contractor") pursuant to the following terms and
conditions.

ARTICLE I STATEMENT OF WORK

The work to be performed under this Agreement is described in this Article, in the County's
Request for Proposals dated April 6, 2026, and the Contractor's Technical and Cost
Proposals, dated May 15, 2026. The Contractor's approved Technical Proposal and Cost
Proposal are attached hereto as Attachment A and Attachment B respectively and
incorporated herein by reference. If there is any conflict between the approved Technical
Proposal and Cost Proposal, the Request for Proposals and this Agreement, the provisions
of this Agreement shall control, followed by the Request for Proposals.

ARTICLE II TERM OF AGREEMENT

This Agreement shall commence on September 1, 2026, and continue through August 31,
2029. This Agreement may be extended for two (2) 3-year periods upon written agreement
by the parties.

ARTICLE III DEFINITIONS

As used in this Agreement, the following terms shall have the respective meanings
indicated:

1. "CEW" shall mean covered electronic waste as defined in California Code of Regulations, Title 22, Division 4.5, Chapter 11 and as amended from time to time and subject to reimbursement through the "Standard Statewide Recovery Payment Rate" pursuant to Section 42477 of the Public Resources Code.
2. "E-Waste" shall mean electronic waste which includes, but is not limited to, CEW, computers, printers, monitors, photocopying machines, fax machines, telephones, radios, computer peripherals and microwave ovens.
3. "Universal Waste" shall mean E-Waste, household batteries, fluorescent lamps of all types, and mercury-containing equipment as identified in Section 66261.9 of Title 22 of the California Code of Regulations, and as amended from time to time.

ARTICLE IV LIAISON

A. Contractor shall designate a Liaison who at all times shall represent Contractor in its relationship with County on matters related to this Agreement.

Contractor's Liaison is (name & Title): Kendrick Harrison, CLH Proposals Manager.

County's Liaison is (name & Title): Jessica Skillen, Deputy Director.

B. Contractor shall designate a Primary Contact with whom the County will communicate regarding the scheduling, documentation packets and data compilation. The designated Primary Contact shall continue in this capacity unless and until the Primary Contact is removed at the request of County, is no longer employed by Contractor, or is replaced with the written approval of County, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld.

Contractor's Primary Contact is: Jason Zimmerman, Branch Manager

County's Primary Contact is: Jessica Skillen, Deputy Director.

ARTICLE V SCOPE OF SERVICES

A. The Contractor shall perform in a good and professional manner the Electronic Waste, Universal Waste transportation and disposal and recycling services described in the County's Request for Proposal dated April 6, 2026, and in this Agreement, including Attachments.

B. The parties mutually acknowledge and agree that extra services may be required of Contractor which may include, but not be limited to, Contractor operating a Universal Waste Collection Event or conducting a curbside Universal Waste pick up, or otherwise managing Universal Waste. In such case, the Contractor may be required to enter into a separate agreement or amend this Agreement.

ARTICLE VI COMPENSATION, PAYMENT AND SUBMITTALS

A. The Contractor shall remit to the County per Attachment B, for all CEW collected from County facilities by Contractor.

1. Contractor shall pay County for all CEW material collected that qualifies for the Department of Resources Recycling and Recovery ("CalRecycle's") Electronic Waste Payment Program pursuant to the Electronic Waste Recycling Act of 2003, as amended and as codified in the Public Resources Code Section 42460 et seq. Payment shall be received by County within 60 days of receipt of waste by Contractor.

2. Contractor shall provide County with a documentation package within 30 days following each shipment which shall include the Weight Comparison Tally Log, the Flat Screen Log,

the Weighmaster Certificate, the Certificate of Recycling and the Covered Electronic Waste Transfer Receipt. The Weighmaster Certificate shall include the count of CEW, the net and gross weights for CEW, and net and gross weights for all other E-waste and identify all tare weights. The Flat Screen Log shall include the make, model, serial number and weight for each device.

3. Contractor shall pay County, within 60 days of receipt of waste, for any other waste per Attachment B for which the County is to receive payment. The Contractor shall provide County a Weighmaster Certificate along with the payment. Within 60 days of shipment and no longer than 365 days, the Contractor shall provide the County with a Certificate of Recycling that all wastes have been recycled by downstream facilities.

4. By January 15th of each year, Contractor shall provide the County with a summary report of all E-Waste collected and recycling for the previous calendar year. Three (3) totals shall be submitted as follows:

a. E-waste containing Cathode Ray Tubes

b. CEW

c. All other E-waste

5. By July 30th of each year, the Contractor shall provide a Form 303 completed for all wastes handled by Contractor for the prior fiscal year beginning with July 1st and ending on the following June 30th.

6. If state or federal regulations are changed in a manner that may affect the rates described in Attachment B, Cost Proposal, then County and Contractor shall enter into negotiations to modify the rate schedule for the affected rates. All adjustments shall be based on evidence that the regulatory change has affected the unit rate as established in this Agreement. Any rate adjustment shall be effective upon written amendment of this Agreement.

B. County shall compensate Contractor for services provided for the collection of Universal Waste excluding CEW and E-Waste in accordance with the rate schedule on Attachment B.

1. Contractor shall provide County with an invoice for cost of Universal Waste, supplies and labor. The invoice shall include the net weight of all Universal Waste, hours for labor and an itemized list of supplies.

2. Within thirty (30) days of receipt of the invoice, the County shall have reviewed the invoice and, if no discrepancies have been found, pay the total due. County is responsible for notifying the Contractor of any questions concerning an invoice within fifteen (15) days.

3. When Universal Waste or lead acid batteries have been shipped to another facility for recycling, Contractor shall, within sixty (60) days of shipment, send documentation of receipt by said facility of the waste generated in Siskiyou County. Contractor shall provide the County with a Certificate of Recycling from said facility.

4. Compensation paid under this Agreement shall not exceed One Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars and no cents (\$150,000.00) in any fiscal year. For purposes of this Agreement, a fiscal year begins July 1st and continues through to June 30th.

5. Unless otherwise stated, the Contractor agrees that, in the event of a price decline, the benefit of such lower price shall be extended to the County.

6. As part of any amendment extending this Agreement, the parties shall negotiate in good faith any revisions to Attachment B.

ARTICLE VII SAFETY

A. Contractor shall comply with OSHA regulations applicable to Contractor regarding worker safety, safety equipment or procedures during loading of waste, transportation of waste and at its facility where dismantling and recycling of the waste occurs.

B. Any subcontract entered into as a result of this Agreement shall contain all of the provisions of this Article.

ARTICLE VIII NOTIFICATION

Any notice, demand, request, consent, approval or communication that either party desires or is required to give to the other party shall be in writing and either delivered personally, transmitted by facsimile machine or sent prepaid, first class United States mail. Any such writing shall be addressed or transmitted to the other party at the address, location or facsimile number set forth below. Either party may change its address, location or facsimile number by notifying the other party of the change in writing. Notice shall be deemed received when:

(1) delivered personally;

(2) transmitted by facsimile; or (3) 48 hours from the time of deposit in a United States mail box if mailed as provided in this Article.

ARTICLE IX GENERAL PROVISIONS

A. Professional Ability of Contractor. Contractor represents and warrants to County that it has all of the necessary professional capabilities and experience, as well as all tools, instruments, facilities, and other resources necessary to provide County with the services contemplated by this Agreement. Contractor shall provide properly skilled professional and technical personnel to perform all services under this Agreement. All work performed by Contractor under this Agreement shall be in accordance with applicable legal requirements and shall meet the standard of quality ordinarily to be expected of competent professionals in Contractor's field of expertise.

B. Permits and Certifications. Contractor must be an approved Collector and Recycler with CalRecycle Resources Recycling, have notified DTSC as a Universal Waste Handler and Recycler and have an e-Stewardship Certification.

C. Licenses. Contractor represents and warrants to County that it has all licenses, permits, qualifications, insurance and approvals of whatsoever nature which are legally required of Contractor to practice its profession. Contractor represents and warrants to County that Contractor shall, at its sole cost and expense, keep in effect or obtain at all times during the term of this Agreement, any licenses, permits, insurance and approvals which are legally required of Contractor to practice its profession.

D. Independent Contractor. Contractor and the agents and employees of Contractor, in the performance of this Agreement, shall act in an independent capacity and not as officers, employees or agents of County. Contractor shall obtain no rights to retirement benefits or other benefits which accrue to County's employees, and Contractor hereby expressly waives any claim it may have to any such rights. All employees, agents, contractors, subcontractors hired or retained by Contractor are performing in that capacity for and on behalf of Contractor and not County. County shall not be obligated in any way to pay any wage claims or other claims made against Contractor by any such employee, agent,

contractor or subcontractor, or any other person resulting from the performance of this Agreement.

E. Controlling Law Venue. This Agreement and all matters relating to it shall be governed by the laws of the State of California. This Agreement shall be deemed to have been made and is to be performed in County of Siskiyou. In any action brought relating to this Agreement, proper venue shall be the Siskiyou County Superior Court.

F. Partial Invalidity. If any provision of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, void, or unenforceable, the remaining provisions shall nevertheless continue in full force without being impaired or invalidated in any way.

G. Waiver. No failure on the part of County to exercise any right or remedy hereunder shall operate as a waiver of any other right or remedy that party may have hereunder. A waiver by County of a breach or failure to perform hereunder shall not constitute a waiver of any subsequent breach or failure.

H. Litigation Expenses and Attorneys' Fees. If either party to this Agreement commences any legal action against the other party arising out of this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover its reasonable litigation expenses, including court costs, expert witness fees, discovery expenses and attorneys' fees.

I. Headings. Article and paragraph headings shall not affect the scope, meaning, intent or applicability of the provisions therein.

ARTICLE X AMENDMENT

A. This Agreement may be amended or modified only by mutual written agreement executed by authorized representatives of both parties. B. Neither party shall be obligated to perform obligations arising under an amendment until such amendment has been fully executed by both parties, unless otherwise agreed in writing.

ARTICLE XI ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING

A. The parties recognize that a substantial inducement to County for entering into this Agreement is the professional reputation, experience and competence of Contractor. Assignments of any or all rights, duties or obligations of Contractor under this Agreement will be permitted only with the prior written consent of County, such consent not to be unreasonably withheld, conditioned, or delayed.

B. Contractor shall perform the work contemplated with resources available within its own organization; and no portion of the work pertinent to this Agreement shall be subcontracted without written authorization by County's Liaison, except that which is

expressly identified in the approved Scope of Work and Cost Proposal. If County consents to such subcontract, Contractor shall be fully responsible to County for all acts or omissions of the subcontractor. Nothing in this Agreement shall create any contractual relationship between County and subcontractor nor shall it create any obligation on the part of County to pay or to see to the payment of any monies due to any such subcontractor other than as otherwise is required by law.

C. Any substitution of subcontractors must be approved in writing by County's Liaison.

ARTICLE XII INDEMNIFICATION

Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless County, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and volunteers (collectively, "County") from third party claims, demands, losses, costs, suits, liabilities and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, (collectively, "Liability") arising directly or indirectly from or connected with the services provided hereunder to the extent caused by the negligence or willful misconduct of Contractor, its officers, employees, agents, contractors, consultants, or any person under its direction or control. Contractor shall not be required to indemnify County for the proportion of Liability a court determines is attributable to the negligence or willful misconduct of County. This indemnification clause shall survive the termination or expiration of this Agreement.

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, neither party shall be liable to the other for any indirect, incidental, consequential, special, punitive, or exemplary damages, including but not limited to lost profits, lost data, lost revenues, loss of use, loss of business opportunity, or diminution in value, whether arising under contract, warranty, equity, tort, strict liability, or any other theory of liability whatsoever, and whether or not the possibility of such damages has been disclosed or could have been reasonably foreseen. Notwithstanding any term or condition of this agreement to the contrary and, to the greatest extent allowed by law, County agrees that Contractor's aggregate liability to county, to anyone claiming by, through, or under county, and to any third party for any and all injuries, claims, demands, losses, expenses, or damages, of whatever kind or character including but not limited to an action or claim based on contract, warranty, equity, tort, strict liability, or any other theory of liability whatsoever arising out of or in any way related to this agreement, the work/services, or the project site, shall be limited to the total amount of compensation received by Contractor hereunder in the twelve (12) month period preceding the event giving rise to the claim.

ARTICLE XIII INSURANCE

Contractor, at Contractor's own cost and expense, shall procure and maintain, for the duration of this Agreement, the following insurance policies with insurers licensed in the State of California and possessing a Best's rating of no less than A:VII. The Contractor shall provide notice to County by certified mail, return receipt requested, thirty (30) days prior to cancellation or material change for all of the following stated insurance policies:

A. Workers' Compensation Coverage: Workers' Compensation Insurance for its employees in accordance with the laws of the State of California. In addition, Contractor shall require each subcontractor to similarly maintain Workers' Compensation Insurance in accordance with the laws of the State of California for all of the subcontractor's employees.

B. General Liability Coverage: Commercial general liability insurance in an amount of two million dollars (\$2,000,000) per occurrence for bodily injury and \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage.

C. Automobile Liability Coverage: Automobile liability insurance covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of Contractor arising out of or in connection with the work to be performed under this Agreement, including coverage for owned, hired and non-owned vehicles, in an amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) for each occurrence of bodily injury and \$100,000 per occurrence for property damage.

E. General Requirement: If a general aggregate limit is used, either the general aggregate limit shall apply separately to the work to be performed under this Agreement or the general aggregate limit shall be at least twice the required occurrence limit.

F. Policy Endorsements: Each insurance policy, except Workers' Compensation and Professional Liability, shall be endorsed with the following specific language:

1) The County of Siskiyou, its elected and appointed officials, officers, employees, agents and volunteers ("Additional Insured") are to be covered as additional insureds with respect to liability arising out of work performed by or on behalf of the Contractor, including materials, parts or equipment furnished in connection with such work or operations.

2) This policy shall be considered primary insurance as respects the Additional Insured (to the extent of the Contractor's negligence in the performance of its services under this Agreement). Any insurance maintained by County, including any self-insured retention County may have, shall be considered excess insurance only and shall not contribute with it.

3) This insurance shall act for each insured and Additional Insured as though a separate policy had been written for each, except with respect to the limits of liability of the insuring company.

4) The insurer waives all rights of subrogation against Additional Insured. 5) Any failure to comply with reporting provisions of the policies shall not affect coverage provided to the Additional Insured.

H. Evidence of Insurance and Endorsements: Contractor shall provide evidence of required insurance with original endorsements to County as may be required by the County Risk Manager. Evidence of such insurance shall be filed with County on or before commencement of performance of this Agreement. Current proof of insurance shall be kept on file with County at all times during the term of this Agreement.

I. Unsatisfactory Policies: If at any time any of the said policies or endorsements shall be reasonably unsatisfactory to the County Risk Manager, as to form or substance, or if a company issuing such policy shall be reasonably unsatisfactory to the County Risk Manager, Contractor shall promptly obtain a new policy, submit the same to the County Risk Manager for approval and submit a certificate thereof as herein provided.

J. Failure to Comply: Upon failure of Contractor to furnish, deliver or maintain such insurance and evidence of the same as above provided, this Agreement, at the election of County, may be forthwith declared suspended, or terminated. Failure of Contractor to obtain and/or maintain any required insurance shall not relieve Contractor from any liability under this Agreement.

ARTICLE XIV DISPUTES

A. Any dispute, other than audit, concerning a question of fact arising under this Agreement that is not disposed of by agreement shall be decided by a committee consisting of County's Liaison, Director of General Services and the County Administrator who may consider written or verbal information submitted by the Contractor.

B. Not later than thirty (30) days after completion of all work under this Agreement, Contractor may request review by the County Board of Supervisors of unresolved claims or disputes, other than audit. The request for review shall be submitted in writing.

C. Neither the pendency of a dispute, nor its consideration by the committee will excuse Contractor from full and timely performance in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XV TERMINATION

A. This Agreement may be terminated upon mutual written consent of the parties, or as a remedy available at law or in equity.

B. County reserves the right to terminate this Agreement for convenience upon fifteen (15) calendar days' written notice to the Contractor. Upon termination for convenience, Contractor shall be entitled to compensation for services performed acceptably up to the effective date of termination, at the rates set forth in Attachment B.

C. Should Contractor default in the performance of this Agreement or materially breach any of its provisions, County, at its option, may terminate this Agreement by giving written notification to Contractor. The termination date shall be the effective date of the notice. For the purposes of this paragraph, default or material breach of this Agreement shall include, but not be limited to, any of the following: failure to perform required services in a timely manner, willful destruction of County property, dishonesty, or theft.

D. If County terminates this Agreement for default or material breach, then Contractor shall be liable for any reasonable costs in excess of the Agreement amount incurred by County in order to complete Article I, Statement of Work. In addition, Contractor understands and agrees that County may, in County's sole discretion, refuse to pay Contractor for that portion of Contractor's services which were performed by Contractor prior to the termination date and which remain unacceptable to County as of the termination date.

ARTICLE XVI RETENTION OF RECORDS/AUDIT

A. For the purpose of determining compliance with Public Contract Code section 10115 et seq. and 21 CCR section 2500 et seq., when applicable and other matters connected with the performance of this Agreement pursuant to Government Code section 8546.7, the Contractor, subcontractors, and County shall maintain all books, documents, papers, accounting records, and other evidence pertaining to the performance of this Agreement, including but not limited to, the costs of administering this Agreement. All parties shall make such materials available at their respective offices at all reasonable times during the Agreement period and for three years from the date of final payment under this Agreement. The state, the State Auditor, County, or any duly authorized representative of the federal government shall have access to any books, records, and documents of Contractor that are pertinent to this Agreement for audit, examinations, excerpts, and transactions, and copies thereof shall be furnished if requested.

B. Where County has reason to believe that such records or documents may be lost or discarded due to dissolution, disbandment or termination of Contractor's business, County may, by written request, require that custody of the records be given to County. Access to such records and documents shall be granted to any party authorized by Contractor, Contractor's representatives, or Contractor's successor-in-interest.

ARTICLE XVII AUDIT REVIEW PROCEDURES

- A. Any dispute concerning a question of fact arising under an interim or post audit of this Agreement that is not disposed of by agreement, shall be reviewed by County's Auditor-Controller.
- B. Not later than thirty (30) days after issuance of the final audit report, Contractor may request a review by County's Auditor-Controller of unresolved audit issues. The request for review shall be submitted in writing.
- C. Neither the pendency of a dispute nor its consideration by County will excuse Contractor from full and timely performance in accordance with the terms of this Agreement.

ARTICLE XVIII FUNDING REQUIREMENTS

A. It is mutually agreed that if the County budget of the current year and/or any subsequent years covered under this Agreement does not appropriate sufficient funds for these Services, this Agreement shall be of no further force and effect. In this event, the County shall have no liability to pay any funds whatsoever to Contractor or to furnish any other considerations under this Agreement and Contractor shall not be obligated to perform any provisions of this Agreement. Contractor's assumption of risk of possible non-appropriation is part of the consideration for this Agreement. County budget decisions are subject to the discretion of the Board of Supervisors.

B. If funding for any fiscal year is reduced or deleted by the County budget for purposes of these Services, County shall have the option to either cancel this Agreement with no liability occurring to County, or offer an Agreement amendment to Contractor to reflect the reduced amount.

ARTICLE XIX NON-DISCRIMINATION

A. During the performance of this Agreement, Contractor and its subcontractors shall not unlawfully discriminate, harass, or allow harassment against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religious creed, ancestry, national origin, age, sex, marital status, sexual orientation, medical condition or disability, or usage of family medical care leave or pregnancy leave. Contractor and subcontractors shall ensure that the evaluation and treatment of its employees and applicants for employment are free from such discrimination and harassment. Contractor and subcontractors shall comply with the provisions of the Fair Employment and Housing Act (Gov. Code § 12900 et seq.) and the applicable regulations promulgated thereunder (2 CCR section 7285.0 et seq.). The applicable regulations of the Fair Employment and Housing Commission implementing Government Code section 12990 (a-f), set forth in 2 CCR section 8101 et seq. are

incorporated into this Agreement by reference and made a part hereof as if set forth in full. Contractor and its subcontractors shall give written notice of their obligations under this clause to labor organizations with which they have a collective bargaining or other Agreement.

B. Contractor shall include the nondiscrimination and compliance provisions of this Article in all subcontracts to perform work under this Agreement.

ARTICLE XX CONFLICT OF INTEREST

A. Contractor shall disclose any financial, business, or other relationship with County that may have an impact upon the outcome of this Agreement. Contractor shall also list current clients who may have a financial interest in the outcome of this Agreement, or any ensuing County project, which will follow.

B. Contractor hereby certifies that it does not now have, nor shall it acquire any financial or business interest that would conflict with the performance of services under this Agreement.

ARTICLE XXI ENTIRE AGREEMENT

This Agreement constitutes the entire agreement which is made and concluded in duplicate between the two parties. All prior written and oral communications, including correspondence, drafts, memoranda, and representations, are superseded in total by this Agreement. Contractor has satisfied itself by its own investigation and research regarding the conditions affecting the work to be done and labor and material needed, and its making of this Agreement is based on such independent investigation and research. Both of these parties for and in consideration of the payments to be made, conditions mentioned, and work to be performed; each agree to diligently perform in accordance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement as evidenced by the signatures below.

ARTICLE XXII NON-CONFORMING WASTE

Non-Conforming Waste: If the work involves the transportation and disposal of waste, the County shall provide Contractor with a description of said waste ("Waste Profile"). Upon approval by Contractor, the Waste Profile shall be incorporated into and become a part of this Agreement. Waste materials discovered by Contractor to be non-conforming, if in Contractor's possession, shall be prepared for lawful transportation by Contractor and returned to the County within a reasonable time after rejection by Contractor, unless the parties agree to an alternative and lawful manner to dispose of the waste materials. The County shall pay Contractor at agreed rates for the handling, loading, preparing, transporting, storing and caring for and, if applicable, disposing of such nonconforming

waste materials. Title, risk of loss and all other incidents of ownership to non-conforming wastes shall remain at all times with County. Waste materials shall be considered non conforming if the waste materials are not properly packaged or labeled; or if the waste materials contain constituents or have characteristics or properties not disclosed on the Waste Profile. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary, County shall be solely responsible for any and all losses, liabilities, claims, penalties, forfeitures, suits, and the cost and expenses incident thereto (including cost of defense, settlement and reasonable attorneys' fees) which Contractor may hereafter incur, or pay out as a result of death or bodily injuries to any person, destruction or damage to any property, contamination of or adverse effects on the environment or any violation of applicable federal, state and local laws, regulations, by-laws or ordinances arising out of or related to non-conforming waste materials.

Clean Harbors provides comprehensive hazardous waste handling and disposal throughout North America.

In 1989, Clean Harbors purchased **Chem Clear, Inc.**, an industrial aqueous waste treatment company. This acquisition firmly established Clean Harbors as a waste disposal provider, and the 1995 purchase of an incinerator in Kimball, Nebraska, expanded our resources in this area.

In 1998, Clean Harbors formed its **Industrial Services** division. Our industrial personnel perform cleaning and maintenance services that require fast turnaround, such as hydro-blasting, liquid and dry vacuuming, sodium bicarbonate blasting, steam cleaning, and chemical cleaning of equipment and systems.

In 2002, Clean Harbors acquired the assets of the **Chemical Services Division of Safety-Kleen**. This purchase added 55 service centers, 33 waste management facilities, and 4,400 employees to Clean Harbors' existing resources. In 2007, Clean Harbors acquired **Teris, LLC**, along with its 550 employees, several field locations, an incineration facility in El Dorado, Arkansas, and a treatment, storage, and disposal facility in Wilmington, California.

In 2008, the company acquired two solvent recycling facilities in Chicago, Illinois, and Hebron, Ohio. This acquisition broadened the company's service portfolio and established a substantial presence in the solvent recycling market.

In 2009, Clean Harbors acquired **Eveready Inc.**, a Canadian company providing industrial maintenance and production, lodging, and seismic services. With the addition of more than 2,100 employees, 79 locations, and a service fleet of over 2,400 trucks and trailers, this purchase expanded our energy and industrial service offerings and geographic reach.

Following the Eveready acquisition, Clean Harbors completed a series of additional purchases to enhance and expand its energy and industrial services. These included capabilities in seismic



services, industrial cleaning, pipeline maintenance, industrial lodging, and catalyst and refinery material processing and recycling. In 2011, Clean Harbors acquired **Peak Energy Services**, adding the ability to support oil and gas drilling operations through surface rentals and specialized liquid, solid, and sludge processing.

In 2012, Clean Harbors completed the largest acquisition in its history with the purchase of **Safety-Kleen**, a leading North American used oil recycling and re-refining, parts cleaning, and environmental solutions company. The acquisition added approximately 4,200 employees serving more than 200,000 customer locations across the United States, Canada, and Puerto Rico.

As we move forward, we continue to expand our services and geographic reach through organic growth and strategic acquisitions. In 2013, we acquired **Evergreen Oil**, a California-based company specializing in the recovery and re-refining of used oil. In 2015, we acquired **Thermo Fluids, Inc.**, further expanding our used oil collection and recycling capabilities and strengthening our presence in the western United States.

From 2014 through 2017, Clean Harbors continued investing in used oil collection, re-refining, and lubricant blending and packaging by acquiring and building capabilities to distribute finished lubricants.

In 2018, we acquired **Veolia's U.S. industrial cleaning business**, which added significant scale and capabilities while increasing the size and geographic reach of our existing U.S. industrial services operations.

In 2021, Clean Harbors acquired **HydroChemPSC**, a leading U.S. provider of industrial cleaning, specialty maintenance, and utilities services. Its solutions help customers maintain environmental compliance and ensure the safe operation of mission-critical equipment and infrastructure. In 2022, HydroChemPSC was rebranded as **HPC Industrial**.

In 2024, Clean Harbors acquired **HEPACO**, a leading provider of field and emergency response services based in Charlotte, North Carolina. With approximately 1,000 employees, 40 regional locations across 17 states, and a fleet of more than 900 vehicles, HEPACO specializes in environmental remediation, field services, and 24-hour emergency response. This acquisition expanded Clean Harbors' geographic footprint in the Eastern United States and strengthened its capabilities across rail, marine, and other key service markets.

Today, Clean Harbors operates approximately 900 service locations providing waste transportation and disposal, laboratory chemical packing, 24-hour emergency response, parts cleaning, and field, energy, and industrial services. The company owns and operates more than 100 waste management facilities offering a wide range of disposal options, including incineration, wastewater treatment, landfill, recycling, and specialty disposal. Clean Harbors is the largest hazardous waste disposal company and the largest re-refiner of used oil in North America.



Business Structure

Clean Harbors Environmental Services, Inc. operates as a publicly traded corporation listed on the New York Stock Exchange (NYSE: CLH). The company is headquartered at 42 Longwater Drive, Norwell, Massachusetts 02061 and maintains operations throughout North America and international markets. Clean Harbors operates through an integrated corporate structure designed to provide comprehensive environmental and sustainability solutions through company-owned facilities, transportation assets, technical personnel, recycling operations, and specialized service divisions.

The company primarily operates through two major business segments: Environmental Services and Safety-Kleen Systems, Inc. The Environmental Services division provides hazardous and non-hazardous waste management, technical field services, transportation, recycling, industrial cleaning, emergency response, remediation, and waste disposal services. Safety-Kleen Systems, Inc, a wholly owned subsidiary of Clean Harbors, provides sustainability-focused recycling services including used oil recycling, parts washer services, containerized waste management, and environmental recycling solutions. This vertically integrated business structure enables Clean Harbors to directly manage waste collection, transportation, recycling, treatment, and final disposal services through internally operated facilities and service networks, ensuring operational consistency, regulatory compliance, and accountability throughout the waste management process.

The company maintains an extensive operational infrastructure consisting of more than 100 disposal facilities, recycling centers, wastewater treatment facilities, transfer stations, service branches, and industrial service locations throughout North America. Approach

Clean Harbors will provide the County of Siskiyou with a comprehensive, fully integrated, and environmentally compliant methodology for the collection, transportation, recycling, reporting, and disposal of Electronic Waste (E-Waste), Cathode Ray Tube (CRT) devices and materials, Consumer Electronic Devices (CEDs), and Universal Waste (U-Waste). Clean Harbors' approach is designed to provide the County with a safe, reliable, and turnkey environmental management solution that supports regulatory compliance, operational efficiency, sustainability objectives, and environmentally responsible waste handling practices throughout all phases of the contract.

Clean Harbors maintains one of the most extensive environmental service infrastructures in North America, including hundreds of collection and transfer facilities, permitted recycling and waste management locations, and one of the largest privately owned environmental transportation fleets in the industry. This vertically integrated operational structure allows Clean Harbors to directly manage collection, transportation, aggregation, recycling, treatment, and disposal activities while maintaining operational accountability, regulatory oversight, and environmental compliance throughout the waste management process. Clean Harbors integrated service network provides the County of Siskiyou with a single-source provider capable of managing all aspects of the County's E-Waste and U-Waste program efficiently and consistently.

1. Project Management and Service Coordination

Clean Harbors will coordinate directly with County of Siskiyou representatives to establish service schedules, collection frequencies, designated pickup locations, operational communication procedures, reporting requirements, and waste acceptance criteria associated with the County's E-Waste and Universal Waste management program. Clean Harbors will assign dedicated operational and project management personnel to support ongoing coordination, scheduling, reporting, and service oversight throughout the duration of the contract.

As part of the implementation process, Clean Harbors will evaluate County collection locations, anticipated waste volumes, storage conditions, access requirements, transportation logistics, and operational considerations to develop site-specific collection and transportation procedures tailored to the County's operational requirements. This collaborative planning approach ensures efficient service implementation while minimizing operational disruptions and maintaining regulatory compliance.

Clean Harbors project management methodology is designed to provide responsive communication, proactive scheduling coordination, operational flexibility, and continuous support for County personnel and collection operations. Clean Harbors will maintain ongoing communication with County representatives regarding collection schedules, reporting activities, transportation coordination, regulatory documentation, and operational updates throughout the contract term.



2. Collection and Waste Handling

Clean Harbors will provide scheduled and on-demand collection services for Electronic Waste (E-Waste), Cathode Ray Tube (CRT) devices and materials, Consumer Electronic Devices (CEDs), and Universal Waste (U-Waste) generated through County facilities, transfer stations, public collection locations, and designated waste accumulation areas throughout Siskiyou County. Collection services will include waste removal, segregation, packaging, labeling, loading, transportation preparation, and waste handling activities necessary to support safe and compliant management of regulated and non-regulated materials.

Materials to be collected may include computers, monitors, televisions, printers, servers, communication equipment, electronic peripherals, CRT devices, CRT glass, and other obsolete electronic equipment. Collection services will also include Universal Waste materials such as lithium-ion batteries, rechargeable batteries, alkaline batteries, button cell batteries, compact fluorescent lamps (CFLs), thermostats, and fluorescent light ballasts (FLBs). Clean Harbors personnel will ensure all materials are properly handled, segregated, packaged, and labeled in accordance with applicable Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Department of Transportation (DOT), Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), CalRecycle, and California environmental regulations.

Clean Harbors' trained environmental personnel will utilize established waste handling procedures and operational controls designed to minimize environmental risk, maintain workplace safety, prevent material damage, and maximize recycling and material recovery opportunities. Waste streams will be evaluated and separated according to recycling requirements, material composition, and downstream processing specifications to support environmentally responsible waste management operations.

3. Transportation and Aggregation

Clean Harbors maintains one of the largest privately owned environmental transportation fleets in North America and will utilize company-owned transportation assets and trained personnel to perform all transportation services associated with the County's E-Waste and Universal Waste program. Clean Harbors transportation network includes box trucks, roll-off trucks, trailers, vacuum trucks, and specialized environmental transportation vehicles designed to safely transport hazardous and non-hazardous waste materials.

For the County of Siskiyou, Clean Harbors will utilize its local operational infrastructure to support efficient transportation and aggregation activities. Collected E-Waste and Universal Waste materials will initially be transported to Clean Harbors' West Sacramento branch location, where materials will be consolidated, managed, and prepared for downstream recycling, treatment, and disposal activities. This regional aggregation approach enhances transportation efficiency, operational coordination, scheduling flexibility, and regulatory oversight while supporting timely service delivery for the County.

All transportation operations will be conducted in compliance with applicable DOT, EPA, OSHA, and California environmental regulations governing hazardous and non-hazardous waste transportation activities. Clean Harbors will maintain comprehensive chain-of-custody documentation, manifests, transportation records, and waste tracking systems throughout the transportation process to ensure regulatory compliance, operational accountability, and documentation accuracy.



4. Electronics Recycling and Processing

Following aggregation at the West Sacramento branch, collected electronic waste materials will be transported to Clean Harbors' Phoenix electronics processing facility (PH2), which serves as the company's primary location for dismantling, processing, and recycling electronic waste materials associated with this program. The PH2 facility is currently undergoing ISO and R2 certification processes, with certifications anticipated by August 2026. This facility is specifically designed to support electronic waste dismantling, material segregation, recycling preparation, and downstream material management operations.

At the PH2 facility, electronic waste materials will undergo evaluation, dismantling, segregation, and processing activities designed to maximize recycling and material recovery opportunities while ensuring environmentally responsible management of regulated electronic components and waste streams. Materials including metals, plastics, electronic components, and recyclable commodities will be separated and processed in accordance with established recycling procedures and applicable environmental regulations.

For materials requiring additional downstream processing, Clean Harbors utilizes qualified downstream recycling and processing partners that maintain ISO, R2, and e-Stewards certifications. This downstream management approach ensures that materials requiring specialized processing are handled through certified recycling and recovery operations that support environmental compliance, responsible recycling practices, and sustainable material management objectives.

5. CRT, Fluorescent Lighting, and Universal Waste Management

Clean Harbors maintains specialized capabilities for the management and processing of Cathode Ray Tube (CRT) materials, fluorescent lighting, non-PCB ballasts, batteries, and other regulated Universal Waste streams. CRT devices and CRT glass materials require specialized handling and recycling procedures due to the presence of lead-containing components and regulated materials. Clean Harbors' operational procedures ensure these materials are managed safely and in compliance with all applicable environmental regulations.

The company also owns and operates facilities capable of processing fluorescent lighting materials and non-PCB fluorescent light ballasts generated through the County's operations and public collection activities. Universal Waste materials including batteries, CFLs, thermostats, and FLBs will be segregated and managed using environmentally compliant recycling and disposal procedures designed to maximize material recovery opportunities and minimize landfill disposal.

Materials determined to be non-recyclable or unsuitable for recycling will be properly managed through approved treatment, storage, and disposal facilities operated or utilized by Clean Harbors in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local environmental regulations. This integrated approach ensures environmentally responsible waste management while maintaining operational control and regulatory accountability throughout the waste management lifecycle.



6. Disposal of Non-Recyclable Waste

Clean Harbors will provide the County of Siskiyou with comprehensive and environmentally responsible disposal services for all Electronic Waste (E-Waste), Cathode Ray Tube (CRT) materials, Consumer Electronic Devices (CEDs), Universal Waste (U-Waste), and residual waste streams that cannot be recycled or recovered through standard recycling processes. As part of its integrated waste management methodology, Clean Harbors evaluates collected materials to determine appropriate downstream recycling, treatment, or disposal options based on material composition, contamination levels, regulatory classification, and recycling feasibility. Materials that are damaged, contaminated, non-recyclable, or otherwise unsuitable for material recovery are managed through approved treatment, storage, and disposal with applicable federal, state, and local environmental regulations. This approach ensures the County's waste streams are managed safely, efficiently, and in full compliance with Environmental Protection Agency (EPA), Department of Transportation (DOT), Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA), California Department of Toxic Substances Control (DTSC), and CalRecycle requirements.

Clean Harbors maintains a vertically integrated environmental management infrastructure consisting of permitted recycling facilities, hazardous waste treatment facilities, wastewater treatment plants, transfer stations, incinerators, fuel blending operations, and disposal facilities located throughout North America. This extensive operational network allows Clean Harbors to directly manage non-recyclable waste streams while maintaining complete operational oversight, environmental accountability, chain-of-custody control, and regulatory compliance throughout the waste management lifecycle. For the County of Siskiyou, non-recyclable electronic components, CRT residuals, fluorescent lighting materials, batteries, ballasts, and other regulated waste streams requiring specialized management will be transported using Clean Harbors' company-owned transportation fleet to Pheonix PH2 facility. Depending on the characteristics of the material, disposal methods may include stabilization, thermal treatment, hazardous waste incineration, fuel blending, or disposal at permitted hazardous or non-hazardous waste landfills. Waste materials containing regulated substances such as lead, mercury, cadmium, or other hazardous constituents will be segregated and managed using specialized waste handling and disposal procedures designed to protect human health and the environment.

7. Reporting and Documentation

Clean Harbors will provide comprehensive waste tracking, documentation, and reporting services to support the County of Siskiyou's regulatory reporting and program management requirements. Clean Harbors reporting systems are designed to maintain accurate documentation of collected waste quantities, transportation activities, recycling volumes, disposal records, manifests, and waste inventories associated with the County's E-Waste and Universal Waste program.

Monthly reporting will include submission of CalRecycle Form 197 Transfer Receipts, waste tracking documentation, manifests, transportation records, and material summaries as required under the contract. Clean Harbors will also prepare and submit annual reporting documentation by January 15th of each year detailing the previous year's collection, transportation, recycling, and disposal activities. Annual reporting will include waste quantities, recycling data, disposal



information, transportation records, and program performance summaries necessary to support County compliance and regulatory reporting requirements.

Clean Harbors integrated waste tracking and reporting systems support transparency, accountability, documentation accuracy, and timely reporting throughout all phases of the contract.

8. Regulatory Compliance and Environmental Management

Clean Harbors maintains comprehensive environmental compliance programs designed to ensure all collection, transportation, recycling, processing, treatment, and disposal activities are performed in accordance with applicable federal, state, and local regulations. The company maintains all necessary environmental permits, transportation authorizations, operational licenses, insurance coverage, and regulatory approvals required to manage Electronic Waste and Universal Waste materials.

All key staff members assigned to the County of Siskiyou project receive ongoing training in hazardous waste operations, DOT transportation regulations, OSHA safety requirements, waste segregation procedures, emergency response protocols, environmental compliance standards, and industry best practices. These training programs support operational safety, environmental protection, regulatory compliance, and continuous improvement throughout all service activities.

Clean Harbors' vertically integrated operational structure provides direct oversight of waste handling, transportation, recycling, and disposal activities while supporting accurate waste tracking, environmental accountability, and regulatory documentation management throughout the duration of the contract.

9. Safety and Environmental Protection Methodology

Clean Harbors places strong emphasis on employee safety, environmental protection, operational excellence, and regulatory compliance throughout all environmental service operations. Clean Harbors "Safety Starts with Me" initiative promotes employee accountability, proactive hazard recognition, continuous training, and workplace safety awareness across all operational divisions and service locations.

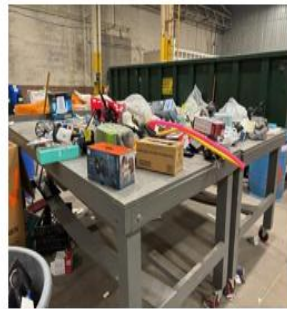

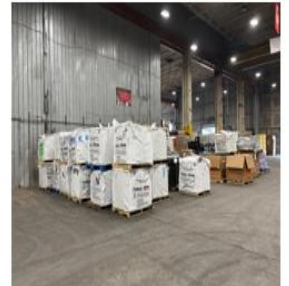

1 PROJECT MANAGEMENT & SERVICE COORDINATION



Upon contract award, we will work closely with County of Siskiyou representatives to establish service schedules, collection locations, communication protocols, and reporting requirements. We will evaluate site conditions and waste volumes to develop customized collection and transportation procedures that ensure efficient, safe, and compliant service delivery.

2 COLLECTION & WASTE HANDLING



We will provide scheduled and on-demand collection of E-Waste, CRT devices and materials, CEDs, and U-Waste from County facilities, transfer stations, and public collection locations. 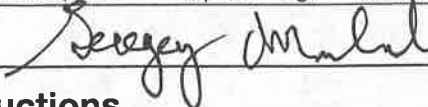
